BONNY & ANNIE – A Story of Survival

Bonny & Annie were both approx 13 years old, healthy, beautiful, confident, trusting and kind natured cats. Sadly, their owners both died within weeks of each other, and due to there being no relatives, the home was cleared and Bonnie & Annie evicted. They found themselves homeless, which was a great shock as they were used to being, much loved, indoor pets.

Following their tragic turn of events, and being left outside to fend for themselves, an extremely kind neighbour tried to take Bonny and Annie in but it wasn't to be, as they couldn't live with her dog. She took them to the vets for health checks and even partly paid for some dental treatment - she absolutely loved them! It is in part on her insistence, that these beautiful cats were not euthanased.

Bonny & Annie were finally taken in by the vet, and remained there for weeks while they tried to rehome them, but with no luck. The vets and nurses were adamant that Bonny and Annie would find homes, as they were so gorgeous (even if they did stop

them from working, as they all liked to cuddle them!). Both cats love being carried around like babies and Annie (as you can see!), has an endearing habit of sticking her tongue out.

Their luck changed when they were then taken in by Cat Homing and Rescue, Warrington and a special appeal for a home placed on Cat Chat. In late November, after only a week or so on site, news came in to Cat Chat that Bonny & Annie had had a successful home check, and were moving to their new home! Their rescuers told us, "This is a direct result of your advertisement and we cannot thank you enough. The two girls are going to live with a gentleman who lives alone, where they will have a lovely, quiet retirement home."

Girls! If you're reading this, we wish you and your new human companion a wonderful life together...

Cold Weather Warning !!!

Congratulations! You've made it through the coldest December in the UK since records began!

But it is only February, and with the risk of unsettled weather and freezing temperatures to come, cats still need protecting. Cats left outdoors for long periods in very cold temperatures are at risk of developing hypothermia or even frostbite, and for older cats subzero temperatures can even be fatal.

Cats should not be shut out of the house for long periods of time and should always have access to warmth and shelter. If your pet answers the call of nature outside, please ensure they can get can get back in again! Check your cat flap regularly to make sure it doesn't get frozen shut by the snow.

For cat who do remain outside in cold weather, such as feral cats, please make sure there

is some outside shelter, which is dry and waterproof. This could be a shed, garage or similar, with some warm and dry bedding to snuggle down in. At the very minimum, a dry, waterproof cardboard box, covered with a bin liner or some cling film can make all the difference. It will need to be weighted down or tucked under a bush for stability, and contain a thick layer of straw

(or thick wollen jumpers / blanket etc. which will need changing regularly).

Sheds and garages need to be checked for hazards where pets are likely to be seeking shelter: Don't leave Antifreeze unattended in places where they can get to it, and take care to mop up any spillages. Less than a teaspoonful of Antifreeze can be fatal if ingested by cats, and usually causes death by kidney failure. So please take care when it's cold out there!

Harder to Home Cats... Tango Revisited - 2 Years On



Tango had a tough start in life, living rough until he was rescued by Kirkby Cats Home, Notts. He was in rescue for months and returned 3 times as he couldn't cope with living in a house after a life on the street. He eventually found his home thanks to his appearance on Cat Chat, with a couple who were prepared to help him over his past trauma. His name is now Siegfried Barker-Powell (you can find him on Facebook!), and here's what his family have to say 2 years on:-

"Well, what can I say? He is absolutely a different cat! He loves being fussed, demands to sit on laps, asks to be stroked, adores being groomed, he keeps his orange & white fur in absolutely pristine condition & even

seems to have stopped fighting!! He got into quite a few rucks when we first got him, but now he's got respect from every other cat on the street, he's fine. Basically the other cats have more sense than to take him on!

Although he had tantrums & sulks and was a 'hard' cat, having had a long time living un-neutered & rough, he didn't have a lot of confidence with people and his body language seemed often to suggest he was almost waiting to be ill-treated. I think he used to bite first

Rescuer 's Corner Featuring - Willows Cat Adoption Centre, South Sheilds

Willows Cat Adoption Centre is a small and personal rescue, which also incorporates an advice centre. All of the cats over 5 months old are neutered and all cats flead and wormed when they arrive. Cats are in pens, but numbers are kept small to avoid stress, and a lot of their cats are quickly homed. They try to find fosterers for cats they think will take longer to home. They pride themselves on matching the most suitable animal to each prospective home for adoption. They consider it crucial for the adopter to first consider the responsibility of adopting a cat for a possible 15-20 years and to take into account the cost of food, flea, worming, insurance and vet fees if the pet is poorly.

Neutering is a top priority at Willows, realizing it is irresponsible cat owners who don't have their pets neutered that have caused the horrendous cat overpopulation problem we have today. They reported an enormous task dealing with an increase of kittens in 2010 and feel it is going to be even worse this year! Sadly, during kitten season, adult cats are overlooked as everyone wants to adopt kittens. However, as the kittens grow, Willows find themselves having to take in the unwanted teenager/adults.

They constantly have a massive waiting list of unwanted cats in need of 'forever homes', most of which have had very hard lives. They've received little love or care and have been disregarded on a whim. "Unfortunately, in this throwaway society, people turn to us thinking we are there to take their cats when they are fed up with them."

Their advice is, if you need to rehome a cat and are unable to find a friend or family member to adopt it, you need to consider carefully which rescues to contact, and a visit is a must before leaving any animal there.

Pets and Humans Relationships - Survey Results

In 2009 a survey was conducted to investigate the relationships that humans have today with their pets. Although pet keeping is not a new human trend (evidence suggests that pet keeping might have its origins almost 40,000 years ago, and even places the domestication of dogs at least 12,000 years ago and cats around 9,000 years ago) the social role that pets play today in the modern human world has changed a lot. Pets now play different social roles, being equal family members, while others offer indirect social support, used as symbols of social status, or even for therapeutic purpose so humans can benefit physically and emotionally, while others who are occupying lower positions in the pet hierarchy are often treated as toys so humans can gain a sense of power or control. Whatever the role of pets is today, the fact remains that humans keep pets perhaps because of the natural and innate human anthropomorphic way of thinking, which makes them seeing human similarities in their pets. Cats and dogs appear to share not only a lot of human features but also a lot of their carer's personalities. Studies have shown that pets also have personality traits that can be categorised under the same personality dimensions of Extraversion, Agreeableness, Conscientiousness, Neuroticism and Openness.

So the study attempted to explore whether these successful anthropomorphic relationships (accepting the position that anthropomorphism is not a negative human tendency but instead seeing it as being a natural hereditary human behaviour that has helped humans through history to understand themselves and the world around them) could be the result of favourable personality traits observed in both dogs and cats. It

also investigated whether there were similarities between pet and human personalities that could have also contributed to such successful relationships.

Although the findings appeared not to be conclusive because of some unforeseen variables, a chosen methodology that didn't produce the expected results and mainly because of the rather unexpected homogeneous and smaller sample size, the results seemed to suggest that the humans and pets that took part appeared to be sharing the same personalities, a result which seemed to perhaps explain the high scores on the anthropomorphic scale. These scores appeared to be independent of pet personalities, perhaps because of the similarities in the demographic characteristics among all participants. Most of the participant pets appeared to score high on the Motivational category. They all scored high on Openness, Agreeableness, Conscientiousness and very low in Neuroticism which could explain that both pets and humans are benefiting from these relationships since pets as it has being previously proved can contribute to well being. Also both had similar scores on Extraversion which could perhaps also support theories about the social role that pets play today. Participants also agreed that their pets can help in time of physical illnesses and depression, bond and protect younger children and being there when they are needed which as result makes them the perfect companions. 
