Hopefully you will never need to call, but if you are first on the scene when an animal is hurt, you will have help at your fingertips. Petting and Playing Aggression

When kittens or young cats attack; biting hands and feet, or try to play but in a rough way, this can be associated with early weaning, and absence of learned social skills. A kitten that is separated from his / her family too early may play more roughly than a kitten that has had more valuable family time. In addition, if humans without realising, play with a young kitten using their hands and / or feet instead of toys, are giving the green light for rough play with people. Also, a cat may start out relaxed, enjoying being petted, but suddenly perceive that they are being handled by a larger, potential predator, and becoming disoriented they may attack, forgetting who is stroking them.

Conflicting feelings of security and fear result in defensive aggression. The cat carer can start by learning to recognise the signs of the cat's unease (suddenly jumping down and grooming, tail twitching, backwards-facing ears, dilated pupils, sudden tensing, etc). As soon as the cat shows any of these signs, the cat carer should stop petting, and rewarded the cat with a little treat and praise. Gradually the duration of petting can be increased as long as it is acceptable to the cat.

To overcome rough play by the cat, the carer can offer alternatives for biting and wrestling, such as toys to redirect the cat's aggressive behaviour. For example by dragging a favourite cat toy along the floor to encourage pouncing or chasing. A good toy is one the cat can wrestle with, such as a soft stuffed toy, about the same size as the cat, so he can grab it and, and kick it with his back feet.

Play sessions should be about 10 to 15 minutes each time but always at the same time. The location of playtime depends on the cat's personality. If he likes being the centre of things, play wherever the cat and his humans spend most of their time. If he is a timid cat then pick a quiet room. Cats need sufficient playtime so they can use some of their energy. They get bored easily with the same toys, so rotating them weekly is a good idea. (ideally 4 or 5 different toys available at a time). 'Hide and seek' is a fun game for cats to play as "found" toys are often much more attractive to them. Play sessions should accommodate the cat's / kitten's own hunting 'preferences', i.e. the carer moving toys to resemble the movements of mice, or birds. When playtime ends, put interactive toys away to keep the cat from getting bored with them.

If these distraction and redirection techniques don't work, the most drastic thing you can do is to withdraw all attention when the cat starts playing too roughly. Simply walk to another room, and close the door long enough for him to calm down. If this isn't possible because the cat is about to bite or scratch, the carer can try growling or hissing. The sudden switch to catlike behaviour will get his attention! Other sounds that can work are single words such as 'STOP', 'NO', or 'OFF', with a commanding voice or clapping (only when it is required so as not to confuse the cat).

Cats find routines and predictable environments comforting, so playtimes, mealtimes, and bedtimes should occur at approximately the same time every day. Bach Flower



Remedies (ideally for cats at least 6 months old) can also help with behavioural problems. They are natural remedies with no unwanted side effects. For playing and petting aggression it is recommended to use a combination of Chestnut Bud, Beech and Vine.

Of course, cat carers need to keep in mind that not all cats are lap cats or will ever become such, no matter how much one might try...!

NEUTERING - WHY DOES IT MATTER?

Unwanted Pets - an Overpopulation Crisis!

People it seems, are not neutering their cats (and dogs) as often as they used to despite many organisations offering cut price neutering to help those people on low incomes. Why? There are probably many reasons -

money is tight and people don't feel it is a priority

some people see it as a way of making money by selling the offspring

some people, often men, don't like the idea of neutering, particularly dogs

some people mean well but just 'don't get round to it' until it is too late

Unneutered Male Cats will wander far and wide, fight, spray and probably sire many unwanted litters in their neighbourhood.

Unneutered Female Cats will roll and call when in season and can have several litters a year producing many unwanted and sometimes sick kittens as well as becoming poor in health themselves, sometimes with serious results which can result in either the death of the animal or expensive veterinary treatment. **Neutered Cats - both Male and Female** are more content, wander less, males smell much less if at all, and both sexes are generally much healthier, happier and less likely to develop certain ailments in later life, including some cancers.

You might be saying to yourself 'I have had my animals done so I'm OK', but do you know anyone who isn't doing the right thing by the animals and allowing them to breed out of control, or even to become a nuisance? If so think of the welfare of those animals, cats in particular, and contact a local rescue organisation who will be able to advise or offer help. Find rescues in your area here: www.catchat.org/adoption

Rabbits! Don't forget also, to spay or neuter pet rabbits. Rabbits reproduce faster than dogs or cats and frequently end up in shelters when the owners cannot cope.

The only sensible, humane way to reduce the number of unwanted animals is to please Neuter!

Rescuer's Corner 🥚

Milton Keynes & North Bucks RSPCA

Background to the branch: "We are entirely self-funded with a dedicated team of animal lovers who help care for, treat and re-home stray and unwanted animals. We receive no financial support from either the central RSPCA or the Government. This means we rely on the generous support of local people and businesses to continue the vital work of helping animals in need. In 2011 we provided treatment for, or re-homed, approximately 1,000 animals. Our vet bills alone were in excess of £130,000.

The branch is at crisis point with the rehoming centre full and a long waiting list. When the branch is full the charity has a duty to concentrate on animals suffering cruelty and neglect which are brought in by the National RSPCA Inspectors from around the city. Injured cats are boarded at vets.

Pet owners have to start taking responsibility for their own animals and ensure their animal's welfare needs are met. The RSPCA can no longer act as a 'recycling centre' for people's unwanted pets.

Areas we are looking for support

CATS RE-HOMING. All our adult cats are neutered, microchipped and treated for fleas and worms. They will also have had (at least) their first vaccinations (flu/enteritis/ leukaemia). We ask a £55 donation to help cover our costs. A home visit may be required.

Some of the cats currently seeking homes can be seen on the Milton Keynes & North Bucks RSPCA Cat Chat homing page. Cats such as Gwynnie, rescued by the

inspectors from a 90 cat household! As you can see she is now a beautiful young lady, who really deserves a good home after what she's been through.

FERAL CATS RE-HOMING. The branch has a number of neutered and microchipped feral cats that urgently need safe homes. They will require access to somewhere warm and dry, like a shed or barn, and need feeding once a day.

RABBITS RE-HOMING. All our adult rabbits are neutered. We ask a £30 donation which goes towards this cost.

KITTEN FOSTERING. We are looking for fosters within the Milton Keynes area who can take in a pregnant/nursing cat and kittens during our busiest time of year. If you have a spare room and would like to help,

the branch will provide all the food, litter and medication.

FUNDRAISING. The branch is always looking for volunteers to help with fundraising and collecting. If you would like more information about the animals in our care, or are able help with kitten fostering or fundraising, please call the Milton Keynes & North Bucks RSPCA on 01908 611179. If anyone is thinking of getting cats or rabbits, please consider visiting the Milton Keynes & North Bucks RSPCA. All are cats and rabbits are neutered and will have at least had their first round of injections. The branch asks for a donation to cover these costs."
