What Goes "Boing Tick Tock"? Spring Time!



As bird song fills the air, frogspawn fills the pond and bluebells pop their heads above the ground, it can only mean one thing... SPRING IS HERE AT LAST! It has been a particularly long and drawn out winter, and we'll all be eager to make the most of the longer, brighter milder days. This goes for our pets too! But there are a few things to consider to ensure they can make the most of it, and stay safe and well:

The blossoming of flowers and trees, and growing grass can trigger allergic reactions in pets. Spring and summer are also the prime biting seasons for fleas. The saliva from fleas coming into contact with a cat's skin can cause allergic reaction. Allergy symptoms can include itching, hair loss and inflamed skin. If left untreated, your pet will scratch, lick and bite to get rid of the irritation, which in turn can cause sores. In



rare cases, a pet's allergy can also cause anaphylactic shock.

Give your pet a breather and reduce the amount of pollen brought indoors, by removing shoes at the door, using a doormat and closing doors and windows when grass is being mown. Vacuum your home frequently, and keep pet bedding clean and fresh. Groom your pet frequently and treat your pet, and your home for fleas regularly. If you suspect your pet has an allergy, visit your vet for advice.

Getting your garden back into shape after winter is always a priority, but do take care with any fertilisers, insecticides, weed preparations etc used. Follow instructions for use carefully, and store these potentially poisonous products safely out of harm's way. Remember also, that many popular springtime plants, including lilies, rhododendrons and azaleas are highly toxic and sometimes fatal to pets.

And finally, more daylight hours means more time for your cats to explore outdoors, and more chance of unplanned kittens! If your pet hasn't yet been neutered, please arrange it RIGHT AWAY!! Thousands of cats and kittens are needlessly destroyed every day because there are not enough homes to go round. This is true also for dogs, and neutering is the only humane answer - don't wait until it's too late! Do also ensure your pet is microchipped. If your pet should become lost, this greatly increases the chance of them being returned home.

So please... 'snip and chip'... and enjoy Spring!

Introductions and Reintroductions

Cat Chat's voluntary Vet Advisor, Zeta told us recently, "Two of the biggest problems we are seeing, is the introductions of kittens in the home, and also bringing a cat back home following a stay at the vets."

Zeta offered the following good advice...

Introducing a new kitten or re-introducing a cat to your home after a stay at the vets can sometimes cause friction with other cats in the household. It can however, be made less stressful for all parties (including the owner!) by taking things slowly.

If possible, keep the two cats in separate areas of the house initially, and use a cloth to wipe over one cat and then the other, so that the cats get used to each other's scent before they actually meet.

The next step is then to try and swap the cats' areas around, again so that they can become familiar with the scent of the new or re-introduced cat before seeing them.

Finally, when you introduce the two cats, ensure that you are there to supervise. Try to center the initial introduction around food or play, so that a positive association is formed in the presence of the other cat.

With a new kitten, each of these steps may take a couple of weeks, and hopefully just a few days to re-introduce an established cat.

I had thought it would take much longer to get to this stage of settling in so please be relieved that he has found a safe, warm forever home."

Rescuer's Corner



Alsager Animals In Need offer shelter and veterinary care for sick, injured, stray and abandoned cats and dogs in Cheshire and North Staffordshire. Should an animal coming into the care of the rescue be sick or very old, then a long term foster home is sought. Short term foster care may be available if people have to go into hospital.

Every effort is made to trace the owners of animals brought in to Alsager Animals In Need, but failing this, once the animal is confirmed as healthy by the Veterinary Surgeon, he or she is vaccinated, microchipped and if necessary neutered.

Alsager Animals In Need endeavour to find loving, responsible homes for their animals, and all potential homes and owners are thoroughly vetted prior to re-homing taking place. An 'after-care' service is then offered, giving advice and support.

Dogs that come into the care of the rescue are accommodated at a local boarding kennel, which is able to provide shelter and an exercise area for 5 dogs. The rescue is able to provide accommodation for 8 cats within 3 shelters, all of which have roomy pens and exercise areas.

The main costs incurred are for the boarding kennels, veterinary bills (which are always very high due to the poor state of health of some of the animals that come to the rescue), erecting and maintaining the cat shelters and pens at foster homes, food, litter, advertising, hire of premises for events and the running costs of the rescue vehicle.

Sadly, unwanted and abandoned kittens are still an everyday reality... and with 'Kitten Season' upon us again, the situation is about to become even more desperate.

From spring through to late autumn, literally thousands of kittens come into rescue shelters across the UK. Sometimes they are taken in when a stray cat has had kittens, but all too often it is where owners have simply not bothered to have their cat neutered, and then find themselves with an unplanned, unwanted litter.

Neutering your cats, male or female, is the best and most

Excessive vocalization in cats

Cats meow for many reasons, the main one being to get attention from their humans. They use at least 16 different meows and over 100 vocal sounds (comparing to only 10 for dogs) to communicate with us. They are intelligent and quickly learn how to get what they want from us!

Cats that sleep a lot or don't do much during the day, perhaps when their humans are not home, are especially prone to excessive vocalisation. If they are to be alone during the day, give them plenty of safe toys to play with, and hidden treats to find. They need sufficient places to hide and play in - paper bags or cardboard boxes for example, and places to hide or climb to keep them occupied.

Another cause for excessive vocalization is separation anxiety. Despite common belief, cats are social creatures, forming strong bonds with people and other animals. Orphaned, early-weaned, or pet shop bought kittens may be at greater risk of developing this stressful condition.

In general, the best thing a cat carer can do when the cat meows (day or night) to get attention, is to try to ignore it. Persistence is needed, so as not to confuse the cat. Eventually they will learn that meowing doesn't really work. If the loud meowing happens during the day, you should wait until they are quiet again, and then offer a small treat to show that meowing doesn't necessarily pay off.

Keeping to a routine makes cats feel more assured, preventing stress that can cause loud meowing. The routine should include feeding, attention and play time. Playing, particularly interactive play, will release pent up energy, and provide the attention they need. Play

sessions should last around 10 -20 minutes and end with the cat being allowed to catch the toy. If possible, play with them just before bedtime so they become tired and ready for bed too.

Older cats that meow loudly at night may be suffering from age related illnesses such as loss of hearing, sight, memory or agility making them feel less secure and more dependent on their humans. In these cases, the carer needs to be more tolerant; making sure the cat knows where their humans are. Having the cat bed in the same room, or allowing them to sleep on your bed can help. Keep the food and litter tray accessible, and allow them to come and go freely. The carer should avoid getting up to reassure.

Pain and discomfort may also cause excessive vocalisation. Check with your vet if you are unsure.




