Positive thinking about FIV

IV positive cats can be difficult to rehome, due to a general lack of awareness and education about the virus. We know more about FIV today than ever before, and that's why, thankfully attitudes are slowly changing. For some 'positive' proof, check out the news of *Suki*, *Dillon* and *AI Capone* in this issue!

Success for Suki!

Witth a friendly, fuss-loving nature and a gorgeous, striking tortoiseshell coat to match, it is hard to imagine how such a lovely cat like Suki could have ever ended up in rescue searching for a forever home.

Sadly though, when this three-year-old moggy was first brought to National Animal Welfare Trust (NAWT) in Thurrock, Essex by social services, it was because her owner had died, leaving her a lost and lonely cat. Step by step, the rescue gave her the TLC she craved, and before long, Suki, though quiet in nature, was thoroughly enjoying being made a fuss of and often spoke to her carers to let them know she appreciated

being stroked and made a fuss of! She was given a cat MOT, consisting of being spayed, vaccinated, microchipped,

wormed, de-flead and blood tested. That's when it was confirmed that she was FIV positive. Suki was added to NAWT's Cat Chat homing page in the hope someone would notice this beautiful little lady, be understanding of her condition and, hopefully, see her for the stunning cat she is. The rescue and all its cats crossed their fingers and paws in hope...



Thankfully, Suki's luck was in! Her new owners were told all about FIV, and went ahead and adopted her. She is now settled in a home where she is truly worshipped (naturally, she says) and is thoroughly spoiled!

Rescuer's corner - Homeless Cat Rescue, Bedfordshire

The cats in the care of Homeless Cat Rescue, Bedfordshire, are cared for in foster homes rather than a shelter. The organisation believes that such an environment gives the best quality of life while waiting for adoption.

Homeless Cat Rescue is firm on the policy of a home check to ensure rehomed cats and kittens will have a safe environment. A follow-up visit is also carried out – usually two-to-four weeks after adoption, to check on how the cat or cats concerned are settling in with their new owners.

The group recognises the dilemma of many adopters on the issue of keeping a cat indoors, or letting them have outside access – perhaps to a garden. They believe that while the outdoor world can be dangerous to cats, that has to be weighed against the natural instinct to explore. Dave from HCR said:

"We can't take that away from them. If we have a cat that shows no interest in going outside, then we will be happy for it to go to an indoor only home. Or, if the cat has a health issue such as deafness, then an indoor home will be requested. But, on the whole, we love homing cats with access to a garden."

With this in mind, Homeless Cat Rescue always microchips cats before adoption. They are also spayed or neutered before re-homing.

Homeless Cat Rescue raises their funds through car boot sales, selling cat

nip toys and of course donations from the public. The group would love to hear from anyone in or near Luton, with items suitable for a car boot sale or that can be sold on



eBay. There is also a recommended adoption donation of £50 - willingly paid by the vast majority of adopters.

The charity was established in 2012 and the main people involved are founder and trustee Jackie, treasurer Allie and web manager and trustee Dave. They gratefully acknowledge the willing help of many volunteers and fosterers.



As well as their own website, Homeless Cat Rescue, Bedfordshire have a Cat Chat Homing Page where you can see many super cats waiting for a home. Cats like Bruce (pictured) who had been living as a stray for at least 6 months in the Luton and Dunstable hospital area.

Bruce was not neutered or chipped when he was rescued, and is estimated to be around 18 months to two years old. He likes his home comforts and a fuss but will let you know when he has had enough. Bruce would like a home with no other cats and no young children. He has now been microchipped and neutered!

With a name like Al Capone, you might think this cat is a big bruiser that loves to scrap and has a devious nature – but you'd be wrong. In fact, Al Capone's name best suits him for being immensely tough to have withstood all that life has thrown at him.

Having arrived at **Rescue Me Animal Sanctuary** in Merseyside from a local vet, life was already hanging in the balance for this eight-year-old Tabby. His chance of finding someone to take him in and care for him was fading... Al Capone definitely had the odds stacked against him. He looked as though he had been straying for quite some time and had a horrendous abscess, a terrible ear condition, he was an older cat, an ex-feral and to top it off, he was FIV positive. However, thankfully the team at 'Rescue Me' threw this brave boy the lifeline he desperately needed.

Once treated and tidied up, a friendly face was revealed and Al Capone was all set for rehoming. All that was needed was for someone to look into those big green eyes and give him the loving home he so needed... And that's just what they did!

Defying all the odds, Al Capone found the home he deserved. Rescue Me Animal Sanctuary said: "This is our second FIV cat to have found a home recently, thanks to Cat Chat (see Dillon's story also in this newsletter). We honestly thought Al Capone would be with us for quite some time, but someone saw him and fell in love! We cannot thank Cat Chat enough." We're delighted that for this Al Capone, prowling the streets is now a thing of the past!

when Rugeley Cats Society in the West Midlands first heard a big-eyed, tortoiseshell Senior Kittizen named Squirtle was to join their ranks, they knew he was one of a kind...

The surgery further enhanced his dashing looks, and also increased the chance of finding a forever home. His age was undeniably going to be an issue, but Squirtle and his rescuers never gave up hope.

Safe to say, Squirtle managed to find himself a fantastic new home! He settled in very well after being spotted on **Rugeley Cat Society's Cat Chat page**. One of their volunteers said he was "the most loving and awesome cat I've ever had the pleasure to meet."

DILLON SWAPS DOCKS FOR DES. RES!

Abandoned cars, wheelie bins, doorsteps... the list of locations for where abandoned cats are found is endless, but for Rescue Me Animal Sanctuary in Merseyside, there was a new one to add to their list – the docks.

Roaming alone in an awful condition, young boy Dillon (right) was rescued when all hope seemed lost. This twoyear-old feline was at last taken in and cared for, and tested positive for FIV.

Determined to turn Dillon's life around, the Rescue Me team rallied round to help the poor little chap. A health check and groom session later, Dillon was transformed into Prince Charming! His gorgeous tabby and white coat was revealed and his stunning turquoise eyes charmed everyone at the rescue centre.

Dillon was also found to be very good natured – despite a tough start in life, there didn't seem to be a bad bone in his body. Surely there was just no way this boy could be turned down for a new home...

"Drumroll please..." Love was clearly in the air in February; Dillon stole his new owner's heart and he trotted off to a wonderful new home. Rescue Me Animal Sanctuary said: "We want to say a huge thank you as several of our harder to home cats have now found homes thanks to Cat Chat."

Many shelters across the UK have FIV cats needing homes, and some



will pay for any future FIV related veterinary costs even after homing.



OVER 8,000 CATS HOMED IN 2014

arlier this year we carried out a 'Cat Homing Survey' (kindly sponsored by **Burns Pet Nutrition**) to find out from shelters and rescue groups around the country how many cats had been found homes with Cat Chat's help during 2014. The results certainly surprised us!

The last time we compiled homing figures was back in 2009, and the estimated figure then was around 5,200 cats annually. We knew the homing numbers had steadily increased in the years since then, but we hadn't realised by how many. This latest survey showed that the number of cats & kittens homed over the course of 2014 through the Cat Chat pages was around 8,300!

The increase is partly due to higher visitor figures and greater awareness of Cat Chat, but also the launch last summer of our new Cats Needing Homes database, which has proved very successful. Needless to say we were all delighted and pretty gob-smacked! We're extremely grateful to all the shelters that responded so positively to our survey. Massive thanks also to Burns Pet Nutrition, who very generously donated 3 x prizes of 7 kilos of their Original Cat Food, Chicken and Brown Rice to be awarded to three shelters drawn at random from all respondents. The winning shelters were: Cats Protection Glasgow branch, Leeds Cat Rescue, and RSPCA Friern Barnet branch.





Whilst more than 8,000 cats in happy homes last year because of Cat Chat is a fantastic result, we know that there is still much more we can achieve. This year we'll be aiming to raise awareness of Cat Chat further, to reach even more potential adopters!

We won't rest until every cat is a wanted cat!
